Hello, all. We recently received a letter from our incarcerated member Marilyn Lemak. I wanted to share her appreciation with you all.

Jan. 5, 2024

Hello to my fellow congregants of UUBN, Happy New Year! Just a quick note to let you know how grateful I am to be a member of the church. I proudly tell many people that I'm a member of UUBN, but I don't know that I've told all of you. Thank you for being a church that truly welcomes everyone! I'm grateful and honored to be the first currently incarcerated person to become a member of a "brick and mortar" UU church in Illinois.

I'd like to give a big thank you to the people who keep me connected to the church, and, more importantly, inspire me to more actively live the principles of our faith.

Blair B. consistently sends me the Parish News. I read it cover to cover. It's so helpful to know about all the upcoming services and activities the church offers.

Cindy C. has been a volunteer coming to Logan CC for several years. The "Telling Our Stories, Transforming Our Lives" course is thought provoking, a

good way to show people UU values without being overtly religious.

Babs A. has connected with several inmates at the prison and they just love her. And, now she'll be getting a real taste of Logan because she's going to be leading all the pagan ceremonies. I got to meet Babs at the Yule service.

Julie P. connected with me 7 or 8 years ago after I wrote to UUBN about the newly formed UUPMI [UU Prison Ministry of Illinois]. She comes to visit me once a month and sends me lots of stuff through the mail. She sends transcripts of the church services. Definitely makes me feel more connected to the church.

I hope to one day be able to come to the church in person. Until then, know that you all make a difference in my life by welcoming me as a member.

same as UU, what's different.



Time for All Ages: Francis Irvin



We have a tradition of naming rooms after people: Walker Room after past minister Rev. Kenneth Walker; Gnagey Library after longtime Religious Educator Marilyn Gnagey; Stevenson Library after church member Adlai Stevenson; Fell Room after church founder Jesse Fell; Betty Semlak Playground after longtime Religious Educator Betty Semlak.

The most recent remodeling project created 2 new rooms that needed names! After the congregation voted, the Bradley Room was

named for Lydia Moss Bradley, member and financier of the Universalist Church in Peoria and founder of Bradley University. The other room was named Irvin Room for our own church member Francis Irvin, who died in 2008.

Taking Flight: Sexuality Education for 11th & 12th Graders

When I started as DRE, I asked the high schoolers what one thing they would change about church if they could. They told me that having OWL in 7th & 8th grade was not enough. They needed it again, especially later in high school when they were thinking about graduation, leaving home, transitioning into young adulthood, possibly exploring relationships and their sexuality for the first time. The catch is that most kids that age don't have time for 13 sessions of an OWL class.

At the end of the pandemic, we did a program called Taking Flight. Over three longer sessions, using OWL materials as the source, facilitators highlighted what we thought was the most important information for kids that age to have and talk about. We're planning to run that program again in April. There is no cost because OWL is part of the budget supported through financial pledges from the congregation.

See review in *The Nation* magazine, Dec. 11/18, 2023, pp. 44-46, by Clare Carlisle, professor of philosophy at King's College, London, or ask me for a copy of the review. Kierkegaard is interested in "our deeper, truer self...beyond bodies, thoughts, and emotions." This book explores what Kierkegaard calls "despair," recognized when we are reminded about parts of ourselves that we normally overlook or have forgotten about, and an experience shocks us back into recognizing that loss of the self. Kierkegaard thought that this is evidence of spiritual disconnection from something he calls god. But Carlisle says that "there is nothing specifically Christian, or even biblical, about this notion of

One meeting is already in the planning stages to visit Rep. Chung and urge her to support "Elder Parole." There is also an opportunity to visit Sen. Koehler to advocate for a bill to support immigrants in Illinois. The legislative session runs until May 24 this year.

Important dates:

- * 2/8: first day of early voting and vote by mail ballot mailing
- * 2/20: last day of in-person and mail-in voter registration
- * 2/21: grace period registration begins
- * 3/3: last day of online registration
- * 3/11: last day a military or overseas voter may request a Vote by Mail ballot

* 3/14: last day non-military or non-overseas voter may request a Vote by Mail ballot

* 3/18: last day of early voting

UUA General Assembly 2024!



The 63rd Unitarian Universalist
Association General Assembly will
take place virtually on Thursday,
June 20 through Sunday, June 23,
2024. General Assembly is the
annual meeting of our Unitarian
Universalist Association (UUA).
Participants worship, witness,
learn, connect and make policy for
the Association through democratic
process. General Assembly
includes opportunities for
participants to attend worship

services and workshops, listen to featured speakers and of course, attend general sessions where appointed delegates from member congregations discuss and vote on UUA policy and Actions of Immediate Witness. This year there will be a final discussion and vote on the adoption of Article II (a revision of our statement of principles).

There are two ways to participate in GA:

- 1) full access to all events. Registration for full access is \$280 before March 15, \$315 from March 16 to May 15 and \$400 after May 15;
- 2) Business only participant. You can be one of our 4 delegates and have access to all general sessions, and then be a voting voice representing UUBN. A donation of \$100 is strongly suggested. UUBN has budgeted \$900 to help defray registration costs.

You're Invited to Exploring Membership


