### Rev. Gant Welcomed into Full Fellowship!

#### Dear ones,

I am so pleased to share with you that I've been welcomed into Full Fellowship by the Ministerial Fellowshipping Committee of the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA). This is the last step in becoming a minister with all the rights and privileges that come with it.

The process of ministerial formation in our tradition is rigorous:

It begins with applying to the UUA to become an Aspirant, submitting essays and letters of recommendation.

### The next steps included:

- a comprehensive Career Assessment (psychological assessments and aptitude tests along with a 1 1/2 day in-person session with a psychologist);
- a unit of Clinical Pastoral Education (I completed mine by serving as a chaplain for 10 weeks, splitting my time between a Trauma 1-level hospital and a Behavioral Health Unit);
- a vote by a congregation to affirm that they "see a minister" in me (my home congregation in Lawrence, KS);
- completing an M.Div (I graduated from Meadville Lombard Theological School in Chicago in May 2020);
- completing a two-year, part-time internship (All Souls UU Church, Kansas City, MO 2018-2020);

- interviewing with the Ministerial Fellowshipping Committee (MFC) and being accepted into Preliminary Fellowship (December of 2019);
- being ordained by a congregation (in my case, co-ordained by Lawrence, KS, and All Souls KC in May 2020);
- being "passed" three times by the MFC based on yearly self evaluations, a mentor's affirmation, and evaluations from UUBN's Board and Committee on Shared Ministry (Feb 2024).
- meeting monthly with a mentor
- attending the monthly meetings of the "First Year Ministers" seminar (2020-2021)
- continuing monthly meeting with a peer group for support and accountability

Now that I'm in Full Fellowship, I am eligible to supervise an intern, serve as a mentor, and hold other leadership positions in the UU Ministers' Association and the UUA. (Plus, no more formal evaluations!)

I am grateful to the many people who have encouraged and supported me along the way-- people who wrote the letters of recommendation needed for almost every step of the way, who listened when I needed an ear, and who worked on the many evaluations I needed to turn in. Thank you to all the members of the Board and the Committee on Shared Ministry for your time preparing evaluations, serving as a sounding board, helping me learn the history and culture of the congregation, and helping me grow.

The work of the Committee on Shared Ministry will now shift from a focus on me as the minister toward a focus on the health of all the ministries of the church, asking questions about how well we are living our mission and what's next.

I look forward to continuing to serve this faith that I love-- and doing it alongside you all! Thank you! We will celebrate with cake on February 25th between worship and the congregational meeting.



Kierkegaard is interested in "our deeper, truer self...beyond bodies, thoughts, and emotions." This book explores what Kierkegaard calls "despair," recognized when we are reminded about parts of ourselves that we normally overlook or have forgotten about, and an experience shocks us back into recognizing that loss of the self. Kierkegaard thought that this is evidence of spiritual disconnection from something he calls god. But Carlisle says that "there is nothing specifically Christian, or even biblical, about this notion of godly connection and disconnection." We will work our way through the book in parts. Decarcerate Illinois Petition—Sign On! Sign the <u>Decarcerate Illinois Petition</u> urging Governor Pritzker to reconnect families by acting on clemencies!

### **Advocacy Team Visits Rep. Chung**

At the suggestion of UUANI, three UUBN members, Julie Prandi, Cindy Cotton, and Jan Reynolds, met with Representative Sharon Chung on February 19 to lobby for bills that would open up the possibility of parole for people sentenced to life in prison or others who have been incarcerated for 20+ years. This is the reform that the Illinois Prison Ministry knows is the number one priority for people behind bars and their families. Bringing back parole (which was abolished in Illinois in 1978) would give people a chance to demonstrate before the Parole Board that they were rehabilitated, pose no threat to society, and could therefore be released early. Studies show that older inmates have aged out of crime and recidivism rates of such people are below 1%.

- \* 3/11: last day a military or overseas voter may request a Vote by Mail ballot
- \* 3/14: last day non-military or non-overseas voter may request a Vote by Mail ballot
- \* 3/18: last day of early voting

# Save the Date for Adult Mental Health First Aid Training


Wednesday, July 24, 8:00-5:00, Fell Room

# Bring Your Pop Can Tabs to Church

Ronald McDonald House Charities provides housing, support, and community so that families with children who have serious medical needs can stay together while receiving medical care. This global

organization has over 380 Ronald McDonald Houses in 64 countries. Each one accommodates families with children receiving treatment who are being treated at nearby hospitals and medical facilities. Regardless of whether you choose to eat at Mcdonald's, RMH is a nonprofit organization that truly supports families facing the emotional and economic toll of having a critically ill child in the hospital or other treatment centers.

We are one of those families. For the past 9 years, we have found a welcoming refuge at RMH facilities in the Chicago area. We are so grateful for the organization. We didn't know what RMH's purpose was until we needed it, so we try to share its importance when we can. We've participated in a variety of fundraising activities and advocacy for RMH because we've met so many families facing difficult circumstances who have benefitted from a place of support - from a mother who emigrated to the US with her husband from Iraq and was caring for her 1-year-old with a large brain tumor, to a family from Kentucky whose two children were being treated for life-threatening autoimmune disorders.

There are ways to support this organization that require only your upcycling! Help us collect can tabs (or pull tabs), which contain a trace of copper and are recycled by RMH to raise funds. These small tabs can add up to tens of thousands of dollars used to house and feed families and provide supportive staff and volunteers.

Bring your can tabs to church and place them in the RMH donation box located by the RE info in the Fell Room (with many thanks to Terina for suggesting this!). We will deliver your donated tabs to the Ronald McDonald House where we stay in Chicago near Lurie Children's Hospital.

# Clothing Donations needed for ISU's Gender Affirmation Station


As part of our support for gender expression in our community, we help collect clothes for ISU's
