From the Minister's Desk

What's Up in August Worship?

Next month you won't want to miss worship! **August 4** we will hear from some octogenarians in the congregation. What wisdom do they have to share with us? How have their religious and spiritual beliefs evolved over time?

August 11 there will be NO worship service. Not having a service that day was always the plan so that we could host training for facilitators for our Our Whole Lives (OWL) sexuality education program throughout the building. However, not enough people registered for the training, and it was cancelled. In the meantime, I had let staff know they could have a Sunday off that week. It wouldn't be fair to now tell staff that they have to cancel their plans, so we're going to be closed that day and give everyone a day off. Some Welcome Team members will be at church to greet anyone who misses the memo. I hope you'll take the opportunity to explore another UU church's Sunday service- either online or in person!

August 18 we'll be digging into some UU history, talking about the Prophetic Sisterhood (also called the Iowa Sisterhood). What can we learn from the women ministers who accepted calls to churches on the frontier in the late 1800s and early 1900s?

August 25 is our All-Ages Water Communion. You're invited to bring a small amount of a water from a place that is important to you to add to the communal bowl. A potluck lunch follows the service.

Who Likes to Throw a Party?

In search of people to help make fellowship events happen... We used to have a Fellowship Committee that coordinated social events at the church, but those folks have moved on to other things. We'd like to reconstitute a similar group. It could follow the same pattern as the previous committee or forge a new path. Some of the events you might coordinate include the September Turkey Smoke, Thanksgiving dinner, and the Christmas Eve Cookie Reception. Curious? Please reach out to Rev. Rebecca for a (no obligation!) conversation. We can decide together what this new group might do and how it might operate.

Looking for Some Quiet in Your Week?

Beginning Monday, August 5, join me in the sanctuary at 7 pm every Monday for a simple, contemplative 30-minute gathering. This will include words and music, and time to reflect and light a candle for whatever joys or sorrows you'd like to mark. All ages are welcome; we'll have quiet activities for people of all ages.

Article II is the part of the Unitarian Universalist Association's bylaws that contains our 7 Principles and 6 Sources. The bylaws require a review of Article II every 15 years to see if what it says still rings true for our faith.

At the General Assembly in June, UUs from around the world shared their thoughts on proposed changes and then voted overwhelmingly to accept them.

Postcards for Florida!

There is a new batch of 500 postcards for the Florida general election. Haven't done a set of 20 yet? It's time to pitch in!!

We are writing to alert 969,000 registered Black women voters in Florida to the urgency of voting early this fall. Floridians will have 6 constitutional amendments on their ballot: reproductive freedom, education, campaign finance, property taxes, hunting, and marijuana. Florida has abolished permanent vote by mail, established strict photo ID requirements, and undermined the voting rights of returning citizens who have served their jail terms.

Pick up postcards at church and return (including stamps) to church because we need to hold them and not mail them until October. Don't forget to leave your name and the number of your packet (at the top of the info sheet, the number on the address page). This way Julie can tell who returned postcards and which addresses have not yet been completed. Please return these to the church or to Julie by August 5th.
