## What's Up in August Worship?

**August 11** there is NO worship service. Not having a service that day was always the plan so we could host training for facilitators for our Our Whole Lives (OWL) sexuality education program throughout the building. However, not enough people registered for the training, and it was cancelled. In the meantime, I had let staff know they could have a Sunday off that week. It wouldn't be fair to now tell staff that they have to cancel their plans, so we're going to be closed that day and give everyone a day off. Some Welcome Team members will be at church to greet anyone who misses the memo. I hope you'll take the opportunity to explore another UU church's Sunday service- either online or in person!

**August 18** we'll be digging into some UU history, talking about the Prophetic Sisterhood (also called the Iowa Sisterhood). What can we learn from the women ministers who accepted calls to churches on the frontier in the late 1800s and early 1900s?

**August 25** is our All-Ages Water Communion. You're invited to bring a small amount of a water from a place that is important to you to add to the communal bowl. A potluck lunch follows the service.

## Covenant Small Groups

Small Group Ministry is a time-tested and flexible way to connect members and friends and help deepen their Unitarian Universalist faith. Ministry happens in relationships. Small group ministry deepens and expands the ministry of a congregation by providing an intentional container for those relationships.

Our Small Group Ministry provides:

- Intimacy or building community and deepening relationships.
- Ultimacy or providing opportunity for deeper spiritual exploration and search for meaning.
- Group Pastoral Care or listening deeply to one another as each shares stories of their life journey. Deeper needs can be communicated to Rev. Rebecca or our Pastoral Care Associates.
- Stickiness or the likelihood that people will feel that the congregation is their spiritual home.
- Accountability or the practice of being in a covenantal relationship by making an intentional commitment to one another in service of the gathered group and its higher purpose.
- Leadership Development for facilitators and organizers.

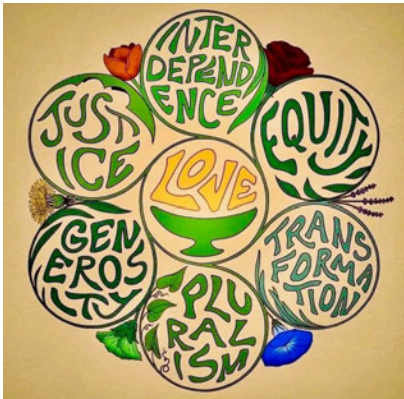

### **Our Whole Lives (OWL) Sexuality Education for Kindergarten - 3rd, 4th and 5th, 7th and 8th Grades**

## Women's Pagan Circle at Logan Correctional Center

On August 1, I was able to gather again with the women who are currently incarcerated at Logan Women's Prison to hold a ritual for Lughnasadh, the first harvest ritual.

There were about 12 women in attendance, most of whom have been coming regularly.

This ritual marked a full circle around the wheel of the year with this beautiful group for me.

We have celebrated all eight Pagan holidays together and have formed friendships with each other. We have built a beautiful community in a setting that actively discourages doing so. The program of rituals is the best attended program at the facility.

I continue to work with UU Prison Ministry of Illinois to find ways to make sure this circle can continue and receive equal treatment alongside other faiths.

## Rummage Sale

BIG thanks to Rain Johnson for running with her idea of restarting our rummage sale tradition. She did a huge amount of work in a short amount of time. And thanks to all the

people who helped! Rain said the support of the congregation was wonderful between all the people who dropped off things to sell, signed up and showed up to help, or dropped things off and stayed to help.

In about 7 hours, the sale made just over \$3500! This was an amazing run at figuring out if we want to start rummage sales again and what works best with the volunteers and space we have.

Ella (my oldest) and I were talking about church rummage sales and which ones we like (we're serious church rummage sale connoisseurs). We like Normal First United Methodist (cashiers in every room, items sorted by rooms spread over 3 floors), Wesley (at the Interstate Center, they serve lunch), and Second Pres (an entire gym of clothes racks!) because they're huge, have a lot of stuff, and are "run like a business" in Ella's words.

These "run like a business" sales all have A LOT of volunteers working the prep days and sale days, price each individual item or type of item, and have a lot of room to spread out. Our favorite sales though are St. John's (so organized), St. Luke's (the nice minister, bake sale, and cool fireplace) and Trinity Lutheran (no air conditioning-boo). Ella suggested those are our favorites because we like the community atmosphere. Shoppers help each other find things and point out good items that seem to be getting passed over; volunteers are relaxed and engaged with the people shopping.

These "run like outreach, community building, mutual aid, and still making money" sales all use fewer volunteers and sell things by asking people to "make an offer" except for a few "price as marked" items.

Ella and I talked about how this seems like a business/capitalist mindset vs community building mindset. We appreciate both, but have a preference for community building and mutual aid.

Like our Downtown Bloomington Farmers Market Bake Sale, items at our Rummage Sale were "make an offer." Unlike the bake sale, some items were "price as marked." This might seem unusual to people who have rummage sales at home or were involved when we did rummage sales in the past (and stopped because volunteers burned out). This new way seemed fitting both for our values and our abilities.

This rummage sale enhanced our connection with our community, reduced the number of things that end up in a landfill, and improved our connections with each other through service. Thank you Rain for organizing us, inspiring us, and helping us live into our mission.
