The Christian Bible includes several references to planting and harvesting, most with the implication that what you plant (or put out into the world) comes back to you. If this seems true, how does that affect our choices as we go through life? And in this season when our Stewardship Committee is asking the congregation to pledge a financial gift, what will we plant? What will we harvest?

10/13 - All Ages Coming Out Sunday - Rev. Rebecca Gant and Terina Carter, Director of Religious Exploration

National Coming Out Day is a day to support anyone "coming out of the closet," ie. LGBTQ people's self-disclosure of their sexual orientation, romantic orientation, or gender identity. First celebrated in the United States in 1988, the initial idea was grounded in the feminist and gay liberation spirit of the personal being political, and the emphasis on the most basic form of activism being coming out to family, friends, and colleagues, and living life as an openly lesbian or gay person. Members of the UU LGBTQ+ community are invited to participate in a ceremony to proclaim and affirm new names, pronouns, or "coming out" in a welcoming and celebratory space. All the choirs will sing; we'll share a potluck brunch after service.

This service is streamed live but is not recorded or shared online later.

Our services are shared live on zoom, and most-- except All-Ages services-- are recorded and posted on YouTube. You may be seen on Zoom or in the recording if you sit in a pew that is not marked "not visible on camera." If you are concerned about being visible on camera, please speak to Rev. Rebecca and we will find a way to accommodate those concerns.

Sabbaticals

We are excited to announce that both Reverend Rebecca and Terina will take sabbaticals in 2025! Terina's sabbatical is February 1 through April 30. Rev. Rebecca's sabbatical is April 21-August 17.

Sabbaticals for religious professionals are different from sabbaticals for academics. Ministry and church leadership is a deeply invested calling - emotionally, psychologically, and communally - that goes beyond the bounds of a 40 hour a week job. To maintain the health and wellbeing of both the minister or religious professional and the congregation, Unitarian Universalist ministers and religious professionals take sabbatical leave for the purpose of rest and restoration. When they return, they bring a rejuvenated spirit back to the congregation, replenishing the vibrancy of our covenants and values.

What does this mean for Religious Exploration, Sunday Services, rites of passage, and Pastoral Care needs that occur during the sabbatical?

Before Terina's sabbatical, she will work with the congregation, RE teachers, Worship Team, and Covenant Group facilitators to create plans for the continued success of religious exploration programming for all ages. Blair's administrative support for RE will continue.

During Rev. Rebecca's sabbatical, the Board will contract with a sabbatical minister to preach and support our Worship Team, provide pastoral care and support our Pastoral Care Associates, and support our staff during the sabbatical time.

More details to come in future newsletters and brochures, but for now we want to make sure you know well in advance - and are ready for lots of delicious food and tasty treats for the send off and welcome back parties to celebrate this time-honored Unitarian Universalist tradition!

Ready to help pull the pieces together to have the Nature Playspace open sometime in October? Let me know which part you can take the lead on making happen.

- 9/23 10/4: build 3 Leopold benches with provided supplies https://www.iowadnr.gov/About-DNR/DNR-News-Releases/ArticleID/1218/Build-a-Leopold-bench (Brad Bell and ??)
- 9/23-10/4: build a music wall with provided materials but don't install it until after the playset is built
- 9/27-10/4: build and install a purchased playset, estimated delivery 09/26 (Brad Boesdorfer, Rain Johnson, and ??)
- 10/1 10/4: Thanks to Erin Furimsky's family, we have a canoe! We need to drill drainage holes for marine plugs, dig a trench, lay in two railroad ties, fill with sand, and nestle the boat into the trench all AFTER the playset is installed

Take Action

Ask your legislators to vote for the Farm System Reform Act, S.271 and H.R.797. This Act would place a moratorium on the construction of new or expanding factory farms with a phaseout of existing large facilities by 2040. Factory farms put public health and the food supply at risk, pollute drinking water, damage rural communities and fuel climate change. Click here to sign up. Urge your legislators to include the Fulfilling Promises to Afghan Allies Act (FPAAA), Amendment 2682, as an amendment to the National Defense Authorization Act. This Act would gain adjustment and permanent residency for Afghan allies who were evacuated to the U.S. after helping our forces and standing up for human rights in their war-torn country. <u>Click here</u>, fill in your information and click on "take action," or scan the QR code on the poster in the Fell Room.

In order to ensure every person has a voice in shaping our communities and our future, ask your legislators to pass the John Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act, the Freedom to Vote Act, the Native American Voting Rights Act and D.C.
