Y'all, I don't know about you, but I've heard a definite increase in complaining lately. I've noticed that when I'm complaining a lot, it's usually rooted in anxiety and not really about the topic of my complaint. There are a lot of reasons we complain. Complaining can be our reaction to change, stress, or uncertainty; complaining can be a way to seek validation. For some of us, complaining is how we ask for help finding a solution. For others, complaining is how we process information and it's really about "thinking out loud."

My young adult children learned long ago that when they complained to me about almost anything, I was going to respond with a suggested solution or try to guide them to a solution. That wasn't always what they wanted or needed. Now they will say, "I think I just need to talk this out with someone" OR "I really need help finding a solution." And if I complain to them, they'll ask me what I'm hoping to get out of the complaint.

Love at the Center

I'm very excited that to offer Love at the Center: UU Values and Covenants as a new small group option! Thanks to a tip from Nancy Bragg, I was able to request the curriculum at no charge to our congregation.

This small group, 11-session program provides an in-depth exploration of our shared faith within the context of our personal identities and experiences, diverse communities, and relationship with the world. If you're new to Unitarian Universalism or are ready to explore the new values and covenants voted on at last summer's General Assembly, this is the program for you!

Generally sessions are paired, so you can expect a focus on two values in the first session and the related covenant statements in the second session. Each value session will focus on questions that explore ourselves and Unitarian Universalism through deep questioning and listening. Putting our beliefs in action in our covenantal faith will be explored through experiences and storytelling that will illuminate how we want to be as faithful people.

Love as a Value:

Love is the power that holds us together and is at the center of our shared values.

Love as a Covenant:

We are accountable to one another for doing the work of living our shared values through the spiritual discipline of Love.

-UUA Article II, passed June 2024

Together, our group will learn to hold each other with love, trust, curiosity and generosity as we explore Unitarian Universalist values and covenants. As we grow our spiritual lives and explore our covenantal faith, we will be "taking care of one another" and ourselves. Holding each other in love seeks to inspire us to bring love out in the world.

Rev. Rebecca and I are working on a schedule that includes consideration of each of our sabbatical times.

Online Parents and Caregivers as Sexuality Educators

A program for Unitarian Universalist parents and caregivers who seek support and skills to be effective sexuality educators of their children. Adults are invited to ask: How can I embody my role as my child's primary sexuality educator in a way that expresses my UU values and faith?

Many Unitarian Universalist children participate in Our Whole Lives (OWL), the lifespan, holistic, values-based sexuality education program provided by the Unitarian Universalist Association and the United Church of Christ, and they may also receive sexuality education in school. However, OWL encourages, and this program aims to nurture, parents and caregivers in their role as their children's primary sexuality educators. Trusted adults carry extraordinary power to influence their children's attitudes and values around sexuality. Many adults struggle to wield that power with intentionality, grace, and confidence. These sessions invite parents and caregivers to find support, insight, and courage with one another.

The sessions are designed to meet the needs of adults raising children of a wide age range, from elementary through high school. Like OWL workshops, these sessions build comfort in talking about sexuality-related topics and offer skill-building activities. Participants are invited to engage deeply with their hopes and fears, their values and practices. This program emphasizes the ongoing adult responsibility to seek and share accurate, current information, as needed, with their child or youth.

Like OWL programs, this program conveys a holistic view of sex and sexuality, encompassing sensuality, intimacy, sexual health and reproduction, sexual identity, and societal sexualization. Participants identify their hopes, examine their concerns, and frame both in the context of their children's lives, acknowledging that their children face different circumstances and pressures than did earlier generations.

The sessions also help adults build skills for healthy family communication. Communication is the foundation of this program, just as it is the foundation of healthy relationships within and beyond families.

Take Action

Ask Congress to pass the Fulfilling Promises to Afghan Allies Act. A bipartisan group of Senators has attached an amendment (S.AMDT 3290) to the Senate version of the National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) for 2025. Negotiations are taking place to combine the Senate and House versions of the NDAA. Ask your Senators and Congressperson to include this amendment in the final version of the NDAA. This amendment will provide a pathway to legal permanent status for eligible Afghans who have been in legal limbo since they were evacuated to the U.S. because they helped our forces in their country. INtegRIty Counseling is a community-based, non-profit counseling agency located in the heart of Bloomington's west side. INtegRIty enables a growing team of concerned professionals to partner in providing counseling, outreach, and community education on topics such as grief and loss, addiction, parenting, and coping skills for those with mental or emotional disorders. Their vision is "Stigma free mental health support for all." They serve all members of the community, regardless of race, gender, belief, orientation, or economic status. They do not have a set fee for counseling, but instead, use a "pay as you can" method and ask clients to contribute what they are able to afford for counseling.
